The annual Homecoming Day Fair is a Norman Rockwell experience for the thousands of visitors it attracts each year. It started as a way to celebrate the nation's bicentennial and is now in its 35th year. This year's fair will be held on Saturday, June 26, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on the streets surrounding Town Hall and the Millicent Library. The beautiful maple trees that line the center's streets provide a canopy for this community event. There's something for all ages. There will be more than 175 booths this year featuring food, arts and crafts and children's games. The day's happenings also feature nonstop entertainment by locally popular musical groups.



Among the tasty treats are cacoila sandwiches, lobster rolls, clam cakes, Japanese noodles, strawberry shortcake and cannolis, to name just a few. A judged art show is held on the lawn by the Unitarian Church. Fire engine rides are available to kids and adults all day long starting at the corner by the Congregational Church. A dunk tank will also be on hand for kids to dunk their favorite Fairhaven celebrity.



This is a volunteer-driven event sponsored and run by the Fairhaven Improvement Association, a civic group involved in Fairhaven for more than 120 years. This year, the fair will be going "green" by providing recycling containers for fair-goers to use. The fair really shows off the best of Fairhaven as a community.
