The Inn is hand hewn from heavy timbers, built like a ship, pegged, worn smooth and salted by sand and wind.



Original Whale Oil Lamps, harpoons and whalebones share space in our lobby and intimate B&B. The Inn is open year round, with facilities hosting parties or gatherings. Every room boasts a water view. A patio to the east ushers in the morning, the marsh, and breakfast- from our railed porch, the sunset over the West Branch.

OUR PRIVATE DOCK offers access to Westport Harbor. We're right on some of the best striper and clam fields in the country! You can fish off our dock or hit the saltwater for bass or bluefish.



Horesneck Beach with is a minutes away from the Inn's door. You can't miss us, the end of the road, Westport Point.
